#### COVID NUMBERS IN SOUTH-EAST ASIA

- **In Vietnam**, Covid-19 management has been effective, with **Zero fatalities** so far. Lockdown has been lifted & domestic flight services have also resumed
- By contrast, Indonesia and especially Java have been hard hit by coronavirus largely on account of :
  - Infrastructure constraints the number of tests have been among the lowest of the nations impacted by Covid with Indonesian Testing (~427 tests per Million Population) vs Vietnam (~ 2,681 Test per million Population)
  - **Delay in flight suspension,** implemented only from April 26<sup>th</sup> in Indonesia. In contrast, Vietnam suspended all flights from March 21<sup>st</sup> (China flights suspended in Jan 2020 itself)
  - Delay in lockdown (implemented only on April 10<sup>th</sup>) and implemented only in Greater Jakarta region, compared to March 14<sup>th</sup> lockdown in Vietnam red zones, and nationwide lockdown from March 31<sup>st</sup>





#### UPDATE ON COVID-19 IN THE REGION

- How widespread is the outbreak in your region?
  - Vietnam has gotten ahead of the pandemic and is slowly reopening its domestic economy with caution.
  - Indonesia has been among the worst hit by covid-19 and is implementing strict protocols to keep it in check. In Indonesia, the majority of cases are concentrated in Java; other island economies have not put in lockdown. Social restrictions imposed in select provinces
- What measures is the government taking to slow the spread?
  - Face masks mandatory in all public places in both nations
  - **Essential services** (wholesale, retail) **allowed to reopen** with safety measures in Vietnam and most of Indonesia (except greater Jakarta)
  - All international borders sealed. Only essential commodities can be moved across provinces/nations. Movement of people not allowed across international border
  - Only domestic flights reopened & closely monitored in Vietnam. All Indonesian flights suspended till June 1st as of now
- Are there governmental restrictions in place?
  - In both nations, gatherings of more than 20 people at public places, outside of public offices, schools, and hospitals have been banned
  - Restricted entry of foreign nationals, and those allowed to enter are quarantined for 14 days





#### IMPACT ON SPICE INDUSTRY

- Overarching industry impact in region
  - No major impact on commodity prices, as the food industry is exempt from most restrictions
  - Additional checks by authorities at factories, warehouses, city limits and international borders
  - Significant volatility observed in USD/IDR exchange rates over last few weeks
  - Number of vessels allowed in port has reduced, limiting container availability
- Specific impacts to commodities have certain commodities or areas been hit harder than others?
  - Vietnam Pepper: Vietnam harvest was completed; negligible impact
  - Vietnam Cinnamon: North Vietnam cassia harvest progress is normal
  - Indonesia Pepper: Lampung pepper season not to commence till July; negligible impact for now
  - Indonesian Nutmeg: Sulawesi production & sourcing affected by covid-19; very few offers from farmers & collectors
  - Indonesian Cinnamon: Padang & Kerinci cassia flows have reduced due to rains & slower harvesting (due to covid)
- Crop conditions
  - Surveys affected as staff cannot travel into the fields.
  - In certain areas, access to fertilizers and getting other inputs is becoming difficult
  - Number of harvests have reduced due to labor shortages





## INDUSTRY AND COMPANY RESPONSE

- How are companies responding?
  - All domestic & international travel canceled in both nations by most companies
  - A number of companies, including Olam have created COVID Task Force to monitor health & safety of employees
  - Work from home on a staggered basis case by case (depending on origin). WFH now lifted in Vietnam, still ongoing in Indonesia
  - **Extra sanitary measures** temperature checks and entry log updates in offices, warehouses and factories
  - Minimal visits from contractors and third party wherever possible
- What controls/assurances are companies putting in place to comply with new governmental requirements and protect the supply chain?
  - Transportation routes through Low COVID areas being suggested to suppliers in Vietnam
  - Increase of bank transfers and online payments to reduce physical contact in both nations
  - Strict sanitization & checking of incoming cargo and personnel at all locations
- Future plans/expectations
  - **Vietnam has moved back to normalcy** after lifting of lockdown, social distancing practice to continue in public
  - Indonesia expecting business as usual from June 1<sup>st</sup> onwards (except Greater Jakarta)
