## The Global Food Supply Chain Too many Cooks? (Or Too Few...)

### The US Food System is Good --and getting better-(So Why Is Everyone So Upset?)

- Food is a declining family cost and asparagus and strawberries are always in season
- A global supply chain and efficient transport have annihilated time and distance
- The newly-discovered truth: "Global" can mean losing control of the supply chain

#### Melamine, Melons, Jalapeño

But also spinach, peanuts & pistachios

- Declining costs, expanded sources and declining resources have somewhat diluted responsibility for oversight
- State inspectors contracted to the Feds; Third-Party Inspections; and MOU's with foreign counterparts
- Problems cropping up throughout the supply chain, so how do we identify the gaps?
- And once a food safety problem is discovered, a lot of product may already be in the supply chain


### A Number of Approaches That are coalescing around some consensus solutions

- Legislative proposals: (Durbin, Dingell, DeLauro, Costa)
- FDA: (Two "Requests for Comment" on use of Third-Parties)
- Industry: ("Food Protection Plans")
- All looking for the right mix of government and industry involvement in the solutionset (Public-Private partnerships)

### So, What Does a Standards Organization have to offer?

- Global supply chains need to acknowledge solutions developed elsewhere (ISO, GFSI, etc)
- Often standards not problem, but conformance to standards can be (toys, tires, toothpaste, etc)
- Using the ISO suite of management, product and personnel certification standards, ANSI (and other national standards bodies) accredit thirdparty testing, inspection and audit entities (UL, Intertek, SQF etc)


# U.S. Standards and Conformity Assessment System comparison with many other economies



## Coordination and Harmonization Activities

- ANSI Standards Panels are cross-sector coordinating bodies established to promote the development and compatibility of voluntary consensus standards and conformity assessment programs necessary to support national and global priorities
  - Coordinate the efforts of the private and public sectors
  - Identify existing standards and compliance programs
  - Define where gaps exist
  - Recommend where additional work is needed
  - Identify organizations that can perform the needed work

# Coordination and Harmonization Activities ANSI Standards Panels




## Public-Private Solutions In Times of "Change" (and stress...)

- Provide problem-solving capacity when both private and public sector involvement is necessary to achieve resolution
- Through Standards Panels, and other fora, ANSI has taken on issues requiring involvement by government members, industry, consumer groups, standards developers, etc.
- Opportunities to offer neutral, expert facilitation to resolve issues that require consensus-driven solutions
- ANSI's unique role as a 'quasi'

### Finding Solutions before the Problems Dictate the Response

An interconnected world requires a consensus approach to be successful; unresolved problems attract draconian solutions.

- Industries with "above-the-fold" policy issues need to be pro-active to avoid regulatory resolution
- Neither industry alone nor government alone is creditable in an interconnected world to provide solution sets; consensus is king








#### **Toy Safety Certification**
