 Creation of one border agency called CBP to manage, control and secure our nation's borders and entry points

 By merging U.S. Customs, Immigration, Border Patrol and Agriculture Inspectors

CBP Presence...

- Over 32,000 uniformed officers protecting over 96,000 miles of U.S. Borders.
- Within our Ports of Entry (POE's):
 - 86 NB ports / 124 crossings
 - 24 SB ports / 43 crossings
 - 29 Express Cargo Consignment Facilities
 - 15 International Mail Facilities
 - 354 Airports
 - 146 Seaports
- Between POE's:
 - Including 33 Inland Checkpoints

Creation of C-TPAT...

Launched in November 2001 with seven partners

- Government-Private Sector Partnership to increase security of supply chains from the foreign manufacturer to the U.S. ports of arrival in exchange for faster processing.
- C-TPAT builds upon existing Customs Industry Partnership Programs.





Supply Chain Security Specialists

- Position established for C-TPAT
- Performs validations with C-TPAT members
- Based in Five Field Offices:
 - Long Beach
 - Washington D.C.
 - JFK
 - Miami
 - Newark





The C-TPAT Approach ...

- Voluntary Partnership cooperatively developed security guidelines vs. mandatory requirements
- Provides for the customized application of guidelines by members
- Provides tangible benefits
- Trust but verify

- Access to Free and Secure Trade (FAST)
- CBP/C-TPAT Training Seminars
- Access to CBP's Web Portal
- Emphasis on self-policing not Customs Inspections

C-TPAT Participation Requirements

- Conduct a comprehensive Self-Assessment of your Supply Chain Security using the C-TPAT security criteria/guidelines
- Submit a Supply Chain Security Profile to CBP via the Web Portal
- Develop and implement a program to enhance security throughout the supply chain in accordance with C-TPAT criteria/guidelines
- Communicate C-TPAT guidelines to other companies in your supply chain







What is a Validation?

- Process to ensure Supply Chain Security measures are implemented and effective
- Joint Process
- NOT an AUDIT
- NO Unannounced visits
- Each validation is customized according to that particular business

- Sea Carriers Effective March 1, 2006 (90 Day Implementation Phase) Currently online at CBP.GOV
- Highway Carriers Effective March 13, 2006 (180 Day Implementation Phase) Currently online at CBP.GOV
- Air Carriers, Rail, Brokers, Freight Forwarders, NVOCC will be next.
