FDA Learnings

- Spice farms can be very small (<1 acre); “lots may contain products from tens of thousands of farms
- Drying out of doors is common; storage can be for years
- *Salmonella* can survive in the low moisture environment of spices
- Wide diversity of *Salmonella* serotypes are found in spices



FDA Learnings

- High *Salmonella* and filth violation rates for spices sampled at U.S. import
- Contaminated spice has been found at spice processing, food manufacturing and retail settings
- Application of current control and prevention strategies is insufficient to prevent consumer exposure to and illness from contaminated spices



Risk Profile

- “Nearing” completion
- Peer review
- Revisions

- Will be used as new approach to assist in regulatory decisions
